

Moving With Pets

PRE-MOVE

. UPDATE TAG

Get a new collar with an easy-to-read name and number with your new address and contact details.

• OBTAIN VETERINARIAN RECORDS

Procure your current vet records so that you can transfer them to your new pets doctor.

• GET YOUR PET USED TO BOXES

You can help your pet adjust to the moving process by bringing in moving boxes early, and by keeping your furry friends in a familiar room you plan to pack up last.

. KEEP THEIR ROUTINE

Feeding, walks and playtime! Try to keep your pet's stress levels down.

DURING MOVE

PREPARE AN OVERNIGHT KIT

Compile an easilyaccessible 'overnight kit' that has enough dog food, kitty litter, toys, grooming tools and medication to sustain your pet and keep them comfortable during the first few days of unpacking.

KEEP A COMFORTABLE, SECLUDED SPACE FOR YOUR PET

Consider putting dogs and cats in a room with a door that can be closed during move-out and move-in. Bring their blanket, toys and crate. Make sure they can still hear you so they don't think that you left them alone.

PET-PROOF YOUR HOME

Secure windows, gates and doors. Check for pest control traps left behind and remove/isolate possible threatening plants in your yard.

POST-MOVE

INTRODUCE THEM SLOWLY

When you arrive, give your pet ample time to sniff around and explore their new surroundings.

KEEP THEIR ROUTINE

The quicker you bounce back to your normal, daily routine, the faster your pet will feel at home.

LOVE AND CARE

Time to spoil your pet with plenty of positive attention and interactions. If your schedule allots, try staying home the first week to help reassure your pet that everything is fine.
