NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH: UPPER WEST SIDE

NO CITY IN THE WORLD PUTS AS MUCH FOCUS ON REAL ESTATE AS NEW YORK. THAT'S THE DRIVING THOUGHT BEHIND OUR NEW REAL ESTATE NEWS COLUMN, WHICH WE KICK OFF WITH A LOOK AT THE UPPER WEST SIDE.

HOT PROPERTY The UWS contains the city's most expensive building: **15 Central Park West**. A 20-something daughter of a Russian fertilizer czar bought the penthouse for \$88 million in 2011, setting a NYC record, but it could be broken if someone buys all three 35th-floor apartments currently on the market for a combined \$95 million.

than anywhere else in NYC. Past and present residents include Judy Garland, Babe Ruth, Lauren Bacall and, of course, John Lennon and Yoko Ono. Law & Order: SVU's Mariska Hargitay lives in a townhouse that was asking \$11 million, and Jessica and Jerry Seinfeld live in the Beresford (211 Central Park West). Bruce Willis also moved back last year, taking a pad in The El Dorado (300 Central Park West).

HAUTE CUISINE The neighborhood's progressive restaurant scene includes Daniel Boulud's **Bar Boulud** (1900 Broadway) and **Boulud Sud** (20 W. 64th St.); **Jean-Georges** (1 Central Park West); Joe Ng and Ed Schoenfeld's **RedFarm Uptown** (2170 Broadway); and Tom Valenti's **Ouest** (2315 Broadway), credited

as one of the first great UWS eateries. There's also the upscale food festival **New Taste of the Upper West Side** (newtasteuws.com), which sells out every summer.

HISTORY AND CULTURE In the early- and mid-1900s, the West 60s were home to mostly African-Americans (the neighborhood nickname San Juan Hill is said to be based on an all-black cavalry unit that fought at the battle of San Juan Hill in the Spanish-

and Latino population. Immigrant gangs ruled the area through the 1940s and '50s—as illustrated in the musical *West Side Story*—until the zone was razed in the 1960s to build Lincoln Center. Today, the UWS features some of the best schools in the country, including the oldest private boys' school in the States, **Collegiate**

(260 W. 78th St.), and the highest ranked, **Trinity School** (139 W. 91st St.). Cultural offerings range from **Lincoln Center** (10 Lincoln Center Plaza) and the **Beacon Theatre** (2124 Broadway) to the **American Museum of Natural History** (Central Park West at 79th Street) and the **New-York Historical Society** (170 Central Park West).
