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
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publisher's note

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

On the home front, Ken has carefully updated his midcentury home, striving to maintain its architectural integrity while adding modern updates and landscaping to match. The front



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
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
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When should I get life insurance?

Life insurance is something everyone should have, no matter when you get it. Normally, life insurance is less expensive if you are young and healthy. Parents can buy insurance policies for their children to give them a firm financial foundation that will grow with the child. However, even if you are not so young, life insurance can still be affordable. One thing I emphasize with my prospective clients is to "start from where you are." You can't go back in time to get life insurance, but you can have it moving forward. Many people think they don't need insurance or they will purchase it later. Later sneaks up quickly. Did you know that more people insure their cell phones than their lives?

What kind of life insurance should I get? What are the different types of policies?

There are two basic types of life insurance: temporary and permanent insurance. Temporary, also known as Term Insurance, is relatively inexpensive and will give you instant protection. It is meant to cover events you want to insure that will have a definite ending time. Examples of events are paying off a home mortgage or sending children to college if something happened prior to these events. Permanent Insurance, such as whole life, is meant to cover your needs throughout your life. It can be used for final expenses or paying off any debts you don't want to burden your loved ones with.

You can think of the two types of insurance like renting vs. owning your home. A term policy is like renting your home. For a low monthly payment, you get a death benefit, but that is all. Then, at some point, the policy will expire. You may be able to

purchase another term policy, but the price may be more than you can afford. On the other hand, a permanent policy is akin to owning your home. A permanent policy includes a cash value portion where some of your premium goes toward the mortgage and a portion goes toward the equity you have in your home. The premium you pay is the same for the rest of your life.

How should my life insurance policy fit into my long-term retirement plan?

Thinking along the house analogy again, life insurance serves as the foundation for your financial plan. If you have a firm foundation, in this case, enough life insurance to protect your family without any loss in their standard of living, then you can build the rest of your plan on top of it. Some permanent policies may be structured to provide you with a stream of income during your retirement years. In some cases, the distribution of these funds is considered tax-free, allowing you to have a secure stream of revenue during retirement instead of (or in addition to) any other funds earmarked for retirement.
