## 110-year-old Pasadena estate once visited by Teddy Roosevelt going for \$7.5 million

A five-bedroom English Arts and Crafts estate designed by lauded architect Sumner P. Hunt has listed for \$7.495 million in Pasadena.

Known as El Arco (or The Bow) for its curved shape, the three-level, 7,339-square-foot house — completed in 1910 and restored and renovated by the seller - has an eatin gourmet kitchen, climatecontrolled wine cellar and billiard room.

The kitchen contains a seating, stainless steel appliances, a pantry and a breakfast area.

Hunt practiced architecture in L.A. from 1888 to the late 1930s. Among his and his architectural partnerships most notable projects was the Bradbury Building (1893), Doheny Mansion (1899) and Southwest Museum (1912-14). He designed El Arco for Chicago transplant Charles D. Willard, a journalist and progressive political activist who, despite his frailty from tuberculosis, became a confidant of Theodore Roosevelt.
